Aiming Point – Commanding Officer and Regimental Sergeant-Major By LCol Smid and MWO Reyes

The most important mission of the Regiment is to produce combat capable soldiers for deployment. Accordingly, our training is devised to ensure that our soldiers are operationally ready. There are a number of aspects to operational readiness which includes mental resiliency, individual and collective training, and personal readiness. In this article, we would like to address the aspect of physical fitness.

The Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) directs that every member undertake the FORCES test annually as the minimum acceptable standard of physical fitness to remain in the CAF. One advantage of this test, as compared to previous tests, is that there is only one standard regardless of sex or age. This makes sense given that our enemy (whether human, terrain, or time) is not likely to distinguish between sexes or different ages. An unfortunate disadvantage is that FORCES test is not particularly difficult to pass and it is our opinion that it does not fairly represent the expectations that we would have of you if deployed to a theatre of operations.

The Canadian Army has moved to reinstitute the Load Bearing March (13 km march in marching order, ie weapon, helmet, tactical vest, and rucksack) to serve as a minimum threshold for those soldiers in the Army to meet if wishing to deploy on expeditionary operations. Accordingly, you will see in our training plan for next year (April 16 to March 17) a minimum of four separate opportunities to conduct the Load Bearing March either in your Battery or as a Regiment.

More challenging than the Load Bearing March is participation in the annual 2 Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group Ironman competition. This competition consists of running 32 km in your army boots, pants, t-shirt, and 40 lbs ruck sack, followed by a canoe portage of 4 km, followed by an 8 km canoe paddle, and culminating in a 6 km run to the finish line. In total, it is 50 km and takes anywhere from 6 to 12 hours to complete. Our Regiment has successfully competed the past two years and we will be fielding a team again this year. The competition takes place in September and your CO and RSM will both be competing. *If you are interested in participating then simply let your chain of command know*.

In order to assist you in improving your level of physical fitness, you will be permitted to participate in physical fitness training on Saturdays at Moss Park Armoury. This training is designed specifically to assist you with the Load Bearing March and the Ironman competition. It will be supervised by officers and Sr NCOs, and you will be able to sign for pay on the days that you participate.

Maybe marching and running are not your thing but you do like to play sports. Great, because we will be starting an outdoor soccer team in September, which will represent the Regiment in a local league. This will then turn into an indoor soccer team once the weather turns. Of course,

the name of the team will be the Gunners! Again, when you participate on the team, you will be entitled to pay. If you are interested in either organizing, coaching, or playing on the team then let your chain of command know.

Although there are many opportunities to improve your level of physical fitness in the Regiment, it will always remain an individual responsibility to do so. This is probably the biggest challenge, finding the time and making the effort to either remain fit or become fit. If you find that you are having difficulty keeping up with our PT during Regimental parades then that should serve as an indicator to you that you need to do something about it. Physical fitness is vitally important to not just your level of success on the battlefield but the success of your entire team, from fire team partner all the way up to the Regiment. You also have a team at home, your family, who rely on you. Being physically fit will play a large role in being able to support them too. There is no shortage of reasons to be in good shape! What's yours?

Exercise Cold Start II – The Mud Gunners of 15 Battery

On the 19th to 21st February 2016, I was in Meaford with 15 Bty for Exercise Cold Start II. Exercise Cold Start II was an experience that I enjoyed very much. During this exercise I was employed as both a Recce Tech and CP Tech. The exercise began on Saturday morning and we were immediately tested on our basic soldiering skills. The Bty was split into 3 groups and dropped off in separate locations by our (simulated) "helicopter," the MSVS. While carrying all of the necessary equipment in our rucksucks the three detachments began to navigate to a designated RV. I was placed as the detachment commander for the CP/Recce detachment for this portion. During this navigation we had the most junior members of each detachment take the lead as a navigator. After marching over muddy snow and water all three detachments met up at the RV.

At the RV we covered our arcs and conducted a "listening halt." During this halt we were attacked by the enemy force and through the quick wit and leadership of Lt. Lum we were able to push the enemy back and win the firefight.

After we regrouped the recce element went forward to see if we were able to cross a raging river directly in the way from our location and our objective. After a scan we decided that we lacked the necessary equipment to cross the river effectively. It was decided that we would travel around and take a riskier route on the road instead. After quickly traversing this obstacle we reorganized at a mortar group RV. From there the recce element departed first to recce out a

possible mortar tube position. After finding a tactically suitable position we radio'd back to the mortarmen waiting at the RV to come forward to their new position. Once they arrived we conducted another listening halt. During this halt the CO of 7 Toronto, Lieutenant Colonel Smid, along with the Padre had come to our position to see 15 Bty operating in the field. After a few words, a prayer and a boost in morale we were given a final moment to take a breather. "Sir, I believe the troops are just eager to get back to work" from Lt Lum was all it took for all the members of 15 Bty to know that it was time to do what we do best.

This is when the exercise transformed into a true test of gunnery skill. We quickly deployed the tubes and were ready to fire. With experienced members at all positions along the mortar line we were able to quickly send rounds down range. During these fire missions it was the first time Bdr Chan and I ever fired the mortars live using the mortar plotter board. We fired through the night, and in what felt like no time at all we were able to successfully fire all rounds on the mortar platforms. It was at this moment when I exited the CP tent to find that the mortar tubes had been dug into the ground waist deep. Thanks to the wet ground and thick clay, we found ourselves spending time digging it through the mud to try and get our baseplates out. These are the moments that would usually be accompanied by the words "this sucks...!!". However the comraderie amongst the troops on the ground was great and the morale remained extremely high even as we dug the mortars out during a cold wet night.

The next morning we quickly loaded up our stores and mortars and met up with our transport, taking us back to base. All in all it was a great exercise in which everyone learned something new and got to practice both their gunnery and basic soldiering skills. UBIQUE!

M777 Conversion Course – The Big One

February 13-21st, myself and 3 others from 7th Toronto RCA; Bdr Park, MBdr Moniz, and MBdr Choi attended the M777 conversion course held by 2RCHA in Petawawa, Ontario

The M777 is a 155 mm light howitzer that can be towed by an HLVW truck or slung by Chinook helicopter. Mounted on the gun is the digital gun management system (DGMS) which consists of navigation, pointing and self location. This allows the gun to come into action quickly and accurately.

A detachment of 10 soldiers is ideal to operate the M777, but if circumstances require, the howitzer can be fired with 4 soldiers. The howitzer has a fast rate of 4 rounds per minute. Depending on the type of ammunition used, the M777 can fire up to 40km.

During our time on course we were equipped with knowledge of the components, maintenance and operation of the M777. We woke up early each day conducting our physical fitness before starting our compact days of classes. We completed the course working alongside other reserve units.

The final confirmation of what we had learned was to put rounds down range. On February 20th, 2016 our course went into the field with 2 RCHA and some honorary guests including Colonel Peter Williams (who fired his last round), Brigadier-General Patterson and Lieutenant Colonel Meehan. All in all, it was a great learning experience and a wonderful opportunity to work with the 2nd Regiment, RCHA.



Battery Commander 15th Battery – Our First Honorary Colonel Frank Fauquier Arnoldi, DSO and Bar (1889 – 1953)



- Battery Commander 15th Battery (France & Flanders) and 67th Battery (Siberia), (WW I);
 - Commanding Officer 7th(Reserve) Toronto Regiment (WW II)
 - Honorary Colonel 7th (Reserve) Toronto Group, RCA

Frank Fauquier Arnoldi was born in Toronto on July 7, 1889. He attended St. Alban's Cathedral School in Toronto and in September 1906, at age 17, he was enrolled at Upper Canada College. Upon graduation in 1908 he joined the Royal Military College (RMC) in Kingston. While at RMC he was a member of the Rifle Team and in

1910 won the Kingsmill Bugle. Arnoldi graduated RMC as a corporal in 1911.

Arnoldi enlisted for service in WWI at Toronto on December 7^{th,} 1914was attested at Toronto on January 4, 1915 and was appointed as a Captain in 15th Battery of the 4th Brigade. He deployed overseas on May 29, 1915 arriving in France on September 13, 1915. He was promoted to Major September 14, 1915 and assumed command of 15th Battery. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Order (DSO) on January 1, 1917 [LG 29886 1 Jan 1917] and was Mentioned in Despatches by General Sir Douglas Haig[LG 29890 4 Jan 1917].

While on leave in England in December 1916, he was admitted to hospital and was transferred to the General List. On March 14 1917, suffering from severe Septic Arthritis in the knees and ankles, he was placed on disability leave and returned to Canada; returning to England on November 26 1917 he was declared fit. On May 23, 1918 he was promoted Acting Lieutenant-Colonel and assumed command of the Reserve Brigade CFA at Witley, England. On 21 August he relinquished the acting promotion and assumed command of 67th Battery of the 16th Brigade, CFA for service with the North Russia Expeditionary Force arriving in Archangel on October 1, 1918.

The Gunners of Canada Volume 1 notes "[a]pplication for inclusion in the brigade far exceeded the number required. It was possible therefore to be highly selective in forming the batteries". Arnoldi was awarded a Bar to the DSO [LG 31359 27 May 1919]: "He has handled his battery on all occasions with marked determination and skill. Major Arnoldi's work in connection with the retirement from Seltyo and the battle of Toulgas on the 11th November, 1918, was of a very high order. He has many times made difficult reconnaissances, and to him is largely due the splendid technical fitness and offensive spirit of the battery." The Russian government awarded him the Order of St. Stanislas, 2nd Class with Swords. He arrived in Canada from Russia via England on July 19, 1919 and was discharged on the same date. He was brought to the notice of

the Secretary of State for War for valuable services rendered during the war [LG 31938 11 Jun 1920].

During the Second World War Arnoldi served as a major with No. 81 (Arty) Reserve Company Veterans Guard of Canada, and later, in 1941, Arnoldi was promoted to Colonel and given command of 7th(Reserve) Toronto Regiment retiring in September 1944. Later in 1944 Colonel Arnoldi was appointed as Honorary Colonel of 7th (Reserve) Toronto Group, RCA.

By profession, Colonel Arnoldi was an engineer. He was first employed at railroad contracting and later with the Hinde & Dutch Paper Company. Colonel Arnoldi died at Bracebridge Ontario on August 6, 1953.

Operation Provision/Operation Trillium Response/Course Provision/BWW/LOSV & DabDoobs

Marhaba! (Arabic: *Hello!*) In preparation for the influx of Syrian Refugees the Canadian government has announced, Operation Provision was activated and the call was announced. Within days notice, my chain of command reached out to the unit personnel asking for volunteers for this operation that was about to unfold. Eight soldiers from 7th Toronto Regiment RCA were chosen and sent to Denison for a day long excursion of paperwork, waiting, and anxiety. In the end, three 7th Toronto soldiers were chosen; a platoon was formed to support OP Provision at 8 Wing Trenton. ILS Trenton, ILS Meaford, ILS Borden, ILS Kingston, ILS Petawawa were the CAF bases chosen to provide Intermittent Lodging Sites (ILS) for the Syrian refugees.



During the early stages of the operation I was placed as No 1 Section 2IC, and then later moved up to No 1 Section Commander. Other gunners within the platoon were Sgt Held (3 Section Commander, 56th Field), Bdr Kyle (56th Field), Bdr Sutton (56th Field), Gnr Dowd (56th Field), Gnr Smith (56th Field), Bdr Espeut (7th Toronto), and Bdr McCulloch. (7th Toronto). Captain Leslie (7th Toronto) and Bdr Rae (7th Toronto) were placed in the A-Pod for Operation Provision. (More on this later)



We deployed the Night of November 25th, 2016 and hopped on buses heading to Trenton Airbase. In preparation for the operation, we conducted 'pre deployment' training which included classes on cultural awareness, basic Arabic, IBTS, BFT's, First Aid, ROE's, Escalation of Force, Force Protection, CQCB, Vehicle and personnel searches,

and many situational briefs conducted by the Wing Commander. For weeks we practiced our training and applied them for two months of Force Protection of 8 Wing Trenton. Within the platoon, section commanders were able to take their sections out for 12 hour shifts, mirroring the 21MP Flight's schedule, conducting security measures throughout the base - security measures such as personnel and vehicle searches, R.I.D.E. checks, presence patrols and ID checks throughout the base.

On the Morning of 27th January 2016, JTF-C ordered the formal shut down of ILS Trenton, ILS Meaford, and ILS Petawawa and was told to redeploy as soldiers of Operation Trillium Response. So in Preparation for the new operation, the platoon internally and simultaneously conducted a Basic Winter Warfare and LOSV course at Base Petawawa.

At the end of the second week in February, most personnel were on planes headed to Operation Trillium Response. I however was held back and placed with the 'A-Pod' on Operation Provision. The A-Pod directly assisted Immigrations Canada with the

clothing, transitioning, and welcoming of Syrian Refugees at Toronto Pearson Airport. Alas, I was finally going to shake the hands of my first Syrian Refugees.

An emotionally pure experience, one by one Syrian Refugees disembarked the aircraft into Pearson Airport, where a team of smiling Canadian Soldiers assisted the clothing, and welcoming of refugees. Soldiers were seen frantically chasing over the best pink snow boots, glamorous overcoats, and warmest mitts for the family members. My language training during Pre deployment training came in useful as I was able to connect quickly with the refugees. For the most part, I walked around with pockets full of "dabdoobs" (Arabic: Teddy Bears) saying



hello and handing these teddy bears to children and families just to ease the transition that much more. I spoke to teenagers eagerly ready to start school in Canada, and parents ready to work and contribute to the Canadian Society. I put crying babies to sleep and listened to individual stories of war, heartbreak and happiness.

My couple of nights in the A-Pod was worth the two and one half months of 'pre-deployment' training. Operation Provision was a whirlwind of an adventure, full of anxiety, disappointment, and joy. It was all worth the wait.

My Surveillance and Target Acquisition Course with 2RCHA

For my entire military career as a reservist, I was narrow-minded in the fact that I did not pay attention to any further artillery assets besides the guns. Taking a contract with 2RCHA in Petawawa was one of the best choices I could have made as I can now see the role of the artillery in a larger scale.

Going into my contract, I was not really sure what Surveillance and Target Acquisition (STA) even meant, but I did know that I was going to embrace it and try to learn as many new skills as possible. From January 11th to February 16, 2016, other gunners and I were given the opportunity to take the STA tech course, and I was finally able to see the entire battle space, not just the gun line. Being qualified in this tech course ensured all of us came out of it being prepared to work in an STA Coordination Centre (STACC).

Over the 5 weeks of course, we learned how to generate maps, as well as analyzing fragments of artillery rounds found in craters in order to determine the calibre to aid in finding hostile batteries. We learned the threat model of armies around the world, what kind of equipment they use, as well as the Intelligence, Surveillance and Target Acquisition, Reconnaissance (ISTAR) and its process. Through ISTAR, we have seen how to gather Intel, determine where it came from, and then incorporate it into the battle plan. Being able to figure out a possible threat, as well as their capabilities, and locate where they are is a great tool to have in STA.

Going into this course I was nervous because I was new to STA, especially being loaded onto such a technical course, but I soon learned how much I really enjoyed learning about the STA side of the artillery, and so I studied, and worked hard leading me to the Top Candidate award. I truly believe that being a part of 2RCHA for 7 months will benefit me for the rest of my military career. It's a great way to experience the Regular Force lifestyle, especially for those interested in transferring over from the Reserves to Regular Forces. So far my time at 2RCHA has proved to be a great place to serve, and I hope to continue to meet new people and gain various skill sets that I can utilize in the future.

Gettysburg - Civil War Battlefield Tour

From 26-28 February 2016, members of 7th Toronto RCA (LCol Smid, WO Lombara, Sgt Gawley, Sgt Edwards and Sgt Jackson) engaged in a fast-paced, hands-on learning opportunity at several sites

of key battles during the American Civil War.

After a day of travel by bus, alongside members of several other regiments in the brigade, the group arrived at the USMC base in Quantico, Virginia, early on the morning of the 26th. The remainder of the day was spent at various points on the base itself, followed by a visit to Arlington Cemetery, and topped off by seeing the location of the war's first battle, near a river called Bull Run. The following day was divided between Fredericksburg and

Chancellorsville, accompanied by guides provided by our USMC hosts, who provided a seamless

narrative and context to each of the locales. The trip culminated with an entire day spent at Gettysburg on the 28th, the most famous battle of the war, and a thorough study was given of the grounds where the Confederate dream of an independent plantocracy was crushed.

The intent of the trip was to give participants an appreciation and greater understanding of the 'big picture' when conducting operations. On the 7th of February, context was given in the form of a series of lectures from LCol Smid detailing how the Canadian army conducts the "Operational Planning Process" (OPP). With that in mind, each member was given a series of questions regarding aspects of the OPP and how they could've been applied to the battles of the war (e.g. "What was the Union's center of gravity in this engagement?").

Their knowledge of the different aspects of the war was varied, but each member came away with newfound appreciation of the logistical and operational hurdles of the conflict. Sgt Gawley noted at one point that while the objectives of the Confederacy, on a whole, seemed very straightforward, he could now see the merits and detriments behind Lee's plan to invade the north (which culminated at Gettysburg), and how difficult it must've been for the leadership of the Confederacy to settle on a plan.

WO Lombara expressed surprise at a more tactical level, finding it impressive that both armies were able to field such numbers in relatively small areas (most notably the infamous wall that formed a Confederate bulwark at Fredericksburg).


Of particular importance was the introduction of the OPP to the regiment's NCOs. While LCol Smid and other officers are accustomed to planning 'big picture', it was largely unfamiliar territory for the NCOs who are more accustomed to viewing both training and operations "in the weeds". This was most apparent at Gettysburg, where participants were directed to see the various key points of the battle from several different locations and how each affected, indirectly or directly, the other. An example of this was noted by Sgt Edwards when looking out from the famed 'Little Round Top'; he saw how crucial the site was to the battle due to the protection it offered the Union flank, but pointed out to the rest of the group that Culp's Hill, which was relatively far away, was arguably just as important concurrently for the exact same reasons.

By the time the group returned to Moss Park, following vigorous, good-natured debate on the bus, all were in agreement that the complexities of the OPP were more byzantine than a first glance suggested. A solid PD opportunity, and all involved were the better off for it.


John Bremner Celebration of Life

In House Recce Tech Course Lays It All Out!

Well before the guns are able to fire, a number of steps must occur in preparation by the reconnaissance party. Prior to the arrival of the guns, a suitable location is determined and battery survey must be conducted. Orientation and fixation must be obtained and as guns arrive they are placed on a common orientation. This can be achieved with different instruments and devices, such as the Theodolite (T16) or the Gun Laying Position System (GLPS). This procedure is aided by the knowledge and ability of the Artillery Reconnaissance Technician (Recce Tech).

After a busy first half of the training year, the Regiment ran an Artillery Reconnaissance Technician course from 09 January to 14 March 2016. The schedule was demanding

and covered every weekend during this period, with the exception of the Regiment's regularly scheduled exercises of COLD START 1 and COLD START 2. The Recce Tech candidates endured a schedule of 10 straight weekends of training, and managed to maintain the balance between course and their civilian lives. The course had 12 candidates, 11 of which were from 7th Toronto Regiment and one candidate from 56 Field Regiment, and all ranks from Gunner to Sergeant were represented.

The course took place at Moss Park Armouries on Saturdays and Sundays and consisted or lectures and practical exercises. Candidates were tested in several different areas, such as, use the theodolite (T16), use the Gun Laying Position System (GLPS), use the prismatic compass and assist in the conduct of battery survey. There were also a number of other valuable skill sets learned such as measuring distance and most candidates were introduced to the Defense Advanced GPS Receiver (DAGR).

All of the material taught on this course was confirmed by way of three field exercises that were conducted throughout the course. FTX1 and FTX2 were conducted at Cherry Beach in Toronto with candidates getting practical

experience on the T16 and GLPS. FTX3 was conducted at Denison Armouries, where further hands-on experience was obtained and mortars were deployed with the help of 15 Battery. The regiment did not wait to use these newly learned skills as several candidates also got their final confirmation as they were immediately deployed as a Recce Tech on Ex BLACK HAND 16, which was conducted the weekend after the course concluded.

The expertise of course programmer Sgt Etorma and instructors WO Bankasingh, Sgt Wood, Sgt Laplante and MBdr Choi made sure that the candidates were well prepared and had a firm grasp on the knowledge taught to them. The course staff sacrificed most of their weekends over the first couple months of the year to ensure that the course ran smoothly and the candidates had maximum training value. They were able to achieve this in addition to their regular duties within their respective Batteries, and their dedication should be commended.

Overall this course has contributed to a successful start to 2016 training for 7th Toronto Regiment. We were able to produce 12 newly trained reconnaissance technicians for 7th Toronto Regiment and 56 Field Regiment. After a demanding schedule these candidates should be proud of their accomplishments, and confident in their ability to operate as a Recce Tech. UBIQUE!






