I would like to thank the men and women of 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment for the hard work put in over the past few months.

We have been very busy since our stand up in September and everyone has been extremely supportive in growing the Regiment.

Since September, we have fired a 96 Round salute in support of the passing of Her Majesty the Queen, we participated in one IBTS Small Arms Weekend Shoot in Borden, as well as two Gun Exercises in Meaford.

The Regiment returned to St. Clements Church for the first time in 3 years, we were able to fire a Salute in Honour of Remembrance Day, and we were even

able to host our first Soldiers Festive Dinner since being locked down with the Pandemic.

Moving into 2023, we will continue to support the Artillery Communications Course, as well as the first Unit Lead Co-op Course that we will have held in years.

Our primary focus as we move from the CONTINGENCY phase into the COMMITTED phase of the operation cycle is to be able to support operations both domestically and internationally.

7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment will have lots of opportunity to be able to support Op IMPACT (Iraq), which 32 Canadian Brigade Group is the lead mounting force, and Op Reassurance (Latvia), which is being force generated and led by 2 RCHA.

It is of utmost importance that our members are constantly working towards maintaining a green personal readiness, so that when opportunities to deploy are presented we will be ready for the challenge.

Our winter training calendar will provide opportunities to qualify on the FORCE TEST, Personal Fire Extinguisher Training (PFET), and First Aid.

These are all requirements for deployment. Please follow up with your battery leadership to ensure you are present when this training is being run.

Members should be starting to think about what type of employment they would like to have this summer.

The army always has employment opportunities, whether it be as a student on course, an instructor, or employment in a general duties capacity. Our employment opportunities are tailored to work around the schedule of student completing a post-secondary education.

This is best time for members already employed in a full-time capacity to warn off your employer, if you are looking to take time off this summer for a career

course. The more time employers have to plan for your absence the better.

I remain available to assist in negotiating time off for any member of the unit looking to attend Regiment Training or Courses.

In addition to being ready for deployment opportunities, we are also looking to grow the Regiment under Op RECONSTITUTION.

The Chief of Defence Staff has stated that the Canadian Armed Forces needs to grow by 10,000 strong and 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment needs to capitalize on this opportunity.

## CO'S DIRECTION AND GUIDANCE 2022-2023

*The following CO's Direction and Guidance for the 2022-2023 Training year was published in the 7 Tor Routine Orders and is reprinted here for your reference. It has been reformatted slightly for this publication.*



### COMMANDING OFFICER'S DIRECTION AND GUIDANCE TRAINING YEAR 22-23

References: A. 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment Operations Plan 2022-2023  
B. 32 CBG Operation Plan FY 2022-2023

#### Situation:

1. The intent of this document is to provide the Chain of Command with direction and guidance in order to outline my training priorities, as well as detail the expectations I have of our soldiers and leaders in the Regiment. This document will be amended and re-issued at the start of each training year, in order to capture any strategic changes being pushed out by the chain of command.
2. The Regiment is still working through post-pandemic issues. It is important that all levels of leadership remain positive as we continue to work towards pre-COVID training levels. Soldiers at all levels should remain focused on what they can do for Regiment in order to ensure its success. The Regiment will always look out for the best interests of its soldiers who look after it.
3. My intent is to employ a mission command philosophy where I identify the priorities and tasks which must be accomplished by the Regiment, while the intermediate and junior levels of leadership have the freedom to determine how they will complete the various tasks that are given to their batteries/detachments.

#### Mission:

4. 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment will Force Generate Artillery trained soldiers in order to support domestic and international operations.

Lines of Effort:

5. My lines of effort (LoE) mirror Commander 32 CBG's LOOs and are as follows:

- i) Support to Operations (Domestic and International);
- ii) Individual Training;
- iii) Readiness;
- iv) Personnel Sustainment; and
- v) Integration.

LoE 1 – Support to Operations: There are 3 areas within this LOO which the Regiment must focus on:

- i) Maintaining Green Level Personal Readiness Verification (PRV): By maintaining a green status PRV it ensures that all members are fit deploy when call upon to respond to Operations whether Domestic or International;
- ii) Accountability and Serviceability: This involves looking after our equipment and stores ensuring that they are in good working order, ready to deploy at a moment's notice (ie trucks fueled and maintained, radio batteries charged, guns/weapons clean and ready for inspection); and
- iii) Updating systems of record with accurate data: This part of the LoE 1 reflects the Soldier Readiness Program (Reserve) SRP-R. We need to ensure that member's individual qualifications are kept current on our online databases, so that when the Brigade or Division runs search queries they will have accurate reports with respect to who is ready to support. This includes Individual Battle Task Standards (IBTS) records as well as individual qualifications. If it isn't entered into the proper system of record, our Regiment appears to be less ready to support deployments.

LoE 2 – Individual Training: There are 3 areas within this LoE which the Regiment must focus on:

- i) Support to the Battle School/Arty RST 23: The Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) is short 10,000 soldiers. Recruiting efforts are focused on enrolling as many soldiers as the training system will handle this year. The Regular Force is focused on training their own soldiers. Primary Reserve Instructors are required in order to train Primary Reserve Soldiers. We need maximum support from our junior and intermediate levels of leadership to ensure that we can train our own soldiers. One of my priorities is to support a Brigade Level Co-op Course which is solely focused on recruiting soldiers for 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment;

ii) Support to Unit Level Courses: The Regiment identifies courses each year during the operational planning cycle. Once we have committed to running a course as part of our operational plan we have a responsibility to plan it, get it approved by the Battle School, staff it and ensure that required equipment is ordered well in advance to ensure that we are able to meet the minimum requirements set by standards; and

iii) Developmental Period Priorities: These priorities have recently been changed with the CDS issue of Op RECONSTITUTION. DP1 continues to be the top priority as the CAF works towards increasing numbers by 10,000 troops. DP2 is our secondary priority, followed by Primary Combat Function (PCF).

LoE 3 – Readiness: There are 6 areas within this LoE which the Regiment must focus on:

i) Individual Battle Task Standards (IBTS): The Regiment must achieve 90% overall qualification prior to 31 March 2023. There are 6 Key Identifiers being used to determine overall effectiveness, they are: Personal Weapons Test (PWT) level 1 (HQ and Svcs/Band) and Level 3 (9/15 Bty), Standard First Aid/CPR, Distance Learning Courses – CRBN Part 1, Media Awareness, Information Security, and Personal Fire Extinguisher Training (PFET). Soldier Readiness Policy – Reserve requires the Regiment to keep our systems of record up to date on all IBTS qualifications;

ii) Core Battle Task Standards – Artillery Level 3 Live. The Regiment must achieve Artillery Level 3 Live NLT 31 March 2023;

iii) Cold Weather Operations – Level 3 dry. This will be achieved by ensuring that all members of the Regiment have formally completed the Cold Weather Operators Course (Formerly Basic Winter Warfare);

iv) Collective Training – Exercise STALWART GUARDIAN 23 (or its equivalent). 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment will BPT support collective training events like Coop-Gunner (March 2023) and STALWART GUARDIAN (or its equivalent) summer concentration during which many courses will complete they confirmatory live fire requirements. STALWART GUARDIAN 23 lead has been identified as 11<sup>th</sup> Field Regiment in summer 2023;

v) Providing Support to the Territorial Battalion Group (Trillium Series of exercises). Current lead is the Lorne Scots Regiment (2022/2023); and

vi) Mission Task – 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment has been ordered to stand down on all Light Urban Search and Rescue (LUSAR) secondary mission tasks. This LoE will be updated once a secondary mission task has been assigned to the Regiment.

LoE 4 – Personnel Sustainment: There are 3 areas within this LoE which the Regiment must focus on:

- i) Recruiting – the Regiment needs to increase in overall effective strength. There is an opportunity to run a Coop Course through the Battle School which will result in approx. 30 new gunners for 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment. We need to capitalize on this opportunity;
- ii) Junior/Intermediate Level Leadership – The Regiment needs to focus on building up our Junior and Intermediate level leadership numbers. Specific ranks include MBdr to MWO, and Lt to Capt. Deliberate succession planning needs to occur within the unit to ensure members are loaded on career courses and placed into appointments enabling them to grow into positions of greater responsibility. Similarly, those members who are not contributing to the overall growth of the Regiment will need to be managed so as not to interfere with the success of others; and
- iii) Morale: It has been brought to my attention that the Regiment needs to focus on building up the morale of our Junior and Intermediate Leaders. All levels of leadership have a responsibility to make the best of every situation to ensure that effective and motivating training is occurring regardless of the obstacles that need to be overcome. Lead from the front.

LoE 5 – Integration: There is one area within this LoE that Regiment must focus on to ensure success moving forward:

- i) 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto will continue to build upon its working relationship with 2 RCHA and BPT provide individual augmentation on Exercises and Operations during the CONTINGENCY and COMMITTED phase of operations.

6. CO's Priorities: I have identified the following priorities within the LoE's detailed above:

- i) Priority 1 – Artillery BTS Excellence. 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment will achieve Artillery BTS – Level 3 Live NLT 31 March 2023. We will be BPT support Artillery – Level 4 training, specifically during Exercise COOP GUNNER 23 (March Combined Gun Exercise) and STALWART GUARDIAN 23 (Summer Concentration);

ii) Priority 2 – Support to Domestic and International Operations. 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment has consistently over delivered with respect to Domestic Operations. There will be an increase in International Deployment Opportunities coming up in FY 23 – 24. We need to ensure our soldiers are ready to deploy and support all operational tasks that are pushed our way;

iii) Priority 3 – Qualify 90% of the Regiment IBTS while maintaining systems of record as part of the Soldier Readiness Policy – Reserve. Members who have their IBTS and PRV complete will be prioritized for operational deployment; and

iv) Priority 4 - Build the Jr NCO/Jr Officer Corps through preparatory training while deliberately succession planning career courses and future appointments within the Regiment.

7. CO's Critical Information Requirements (CCIRs): Should any these occur, I need to be notified as soon as possible:

i) The death, serious injury or hospitalization of one of the members of 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment;

ii) The arrest of any member in the Regiment;

iii) Any alleged acts of criminal activity, or acts of sexual misconduct which breach the code of ethics and zero tolerance policy of the CAF; and

iv) Damage to or the loss of any serialized kit belonging to 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment.

General Guidance:

8. Leadership: My expectations are that leaders will promote a positive work environment and express a positive attitude regardless of the obstacles that we seem to be experiencing in this post pandemic training environment. Whether we are short of equipment, ammunition, or there are training area restrictions, etc, we need to create a work environment that will promote learning and foster retention in the Regiment.

9. Safety: All members of the Regiment are expected to promote a safe working environment. Injuries sustained during training will be documented on a CF98 – Injury Report, or DND 663 Accident Report so that our members can be looked after in the event that an injury has long term side effects extending beyond their service, and that any accidents can be reviewed and learned from so that we do not repeat them in the future.

10. Dress: All members in the Regiment will follow the CAF Dress Manual with respect to orders of dress, maintenance of hair, piercings, etc. All authorized forms of dress will bring credit to the CAF when being worn by members of the Regiment.

11. Conduct On and Off Duty: Members are subject to the Code of Service Discipline when they are being paid by the CAF. This is a black and white policy, but the age of social media has put us into a position where online postings can exist in perpetuity, meaning something posted online while off duty, can come back to haunt individuals when they report in for duty. Members must always hold themselves to a high standard, as you never know who is watching you, waiting to hit record on their cell phone. The Regiment did a great job in this area over the past year. Keep up the good work!

12. Exercise Attendance: The current environment we are working in is forcing us to conduct more and more training in a simulated environment under stricter time constraints. The best training experience will always be out in the field battling the elements and sleep deprivation. Training in the field also provides members with the best exercise stories! Expectations should be communicated to our members that their attendance in the field is expected on exercises unless there is a legitimate reason why they cannot attend. Leadership attendance on exercise is critical and expected to ensure maximum attendance. You get out this what you put into it.

13. IBTS/PRV/PERS/PaCE: The Regiment has a number of deliverables which the Brigade monitors. Keeping on top of these tracked items will ensure that interesting opportunities continue to flow to the members of 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment. Keeping systems of record up to date and flowing up with members who have outstanding deliverables is critical to the success of the Regiment. Ensure you are on top of your administration.

14. Communications: A message sent, is not a message received. Email and Groups.IO, and chat rooms are convenient ways to send out bulk messaging, but if our messages are not being read, or received by our soldiers than we have troops who are potentially missing out on opportunities. Leaders have a responsibility to ensure that tasks, exercise information, instructor tasks, etc are being received by our soldiers. Sometimes picking up the phone is the best option to ensure that messages have been received and are understood.

Conclusion:

15. Ultimately my goal for 7<sup>th</sup> Toronto Regiment is to grow the unit so that when my Command tenure comes to an end, I can hand over a stronger Regiment than when I received it. I would also like to ensure that all of members have a positive experience while belonging to the Regiment. I remain open for suggestions on how to make the Regiment stronger, and how to ensure that morale remains high. Good shooting!

The Band has thrived under Capt Arrigo's leadership and is constantly called upon to support the most important musical tasks in the Brigade, and sometimes covering off Division level musical tasks.






